Just a few weeks ago, most of the Fantagraphics staff went on a day-long inventory at our warehouse. And lo and behold, we turned up a handful of copies of a number of books and comics we thought we'd sold out of. Only a couple dozen copies in most cases—but I figured I'd give loyal Critters readers first dibs on snapping up some of these semi-rarities.

First of all, we still have copies of every issue of Adventures of Captain Jack from #3 to #12. (Some of these have been listed as "sold out" since last year, and a few have been on and off our lists a couple of times.) That includes the whole "Herman and Janet" sequence that started in #5, the Jackie Gleason tribute issue, and many more. Primo stuff!

On the Critters front, I was delighted to find a stash of #11s-the first Christmas issue. This was the first Critters special issue, and since it includes the conclusions to no fewer than three serials (Usagi Yojimbo, Gnuff, and Lioheart), its absence has probably been keenly felt by any number of collectors. It includes such goodies as the premiere of "Lizards," a Mark Armstrong strip, plus Stan Sakai and Mike Kazaleh, li'l onepagers by Templeton, Kieth, and Lafler, all wrapped up in a Ken Macklin cover. And we're selling it for a mere \$3.50.

Further on down the line, we've been listing #18 as sold out for some time now. I don't know why—we've got piles and piles of the damn thing. It's got a knockout Jim Engel cover and story, plus Blue Beagle and Lionheart.

I also ran across a number of Dog Boys—every issue is still in stock, to a limited degree. So are all three issues of Milton Knight, Jr.'s Hugo (although #1 is real low, so only one per customer, okay?)

Remember Doomsday Squad #3 the one with the really lousy printing job on the full-color Usagi Yojimbo strip? Well, I can't recommend it for its aesthetic value, but apparently it's got some kind of collector's appeal and we've still got about a hundred copies at cover price, \$2.00 each. But remember, I warned you: the printing is bad!

Speaking of Usagi Yojimbo, you can still buy every back issue but #1, 2, and #4—although we're running real short on some of them, especially #6 and #9.

Everything on this list is \$2.00 apiece, with the exception of Critters #11, which is \$3.50.

Boy, wouldn't some of these make

great Christmas gifts?

Just a thought. And lookee here after all this greedmongering, I only have room for a single letter!

Dear Kim.

As a comics fan and animal lover, let me say that *Critters* is a terrific showcase of funny-animal comics. The first issue I ever got was #38. Since then I've been sold on *Critters*. It's got to be the best in its class since *Captain Carrot and His Amazing Zoo Crew*, the brainchild of Scott Shaw! (Why does he have that exclamation point tacked onto his name, anyway?) I hope they bring back Captain Carrot, I'd love to see some new CCAH-AZC adventures.

I think the *Critters* artists are marvelous! I like Tim Fuller's zany style, not to mention Stan Sakai's intriguing work and J.P. Morgan's wacky images. Fission Chicken is really great, but my favorites have to be Blue Beagle and Stinz. And I hope Harr Lowhard comes back to *Critters*.

I read an idea submitted by a Mr. John Henry Sain (in #39) calling for a couple characters in the same story. He says he gave it up after reading #28. Well, John, if you're out there, I for one think it's still a great idea. Say, maybe in some *Critters* special in the future, there could be a brace of *Critters* characters in one story. I'm talking all-star jam session here. If it can be done, I'd really like to see it happen.

You're all doing a great job. Keep it up, folks!
