










Tandum "twin" Fighter modification.





Rescue Ship modification.














Naval Rescue modification. (Note: Down crew-members)

















#### Model Mark 6 Designers



Ms. C.H. Thule (left) and with prototype model M\$ T.O. Dobberman (right) at the (1989 A.D.) Air/Space Meet Convention.

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
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Dear Mr. Howell.

Thanks for printing my letter in #3. True, the syntax got mangled in a couple of places in the

editing, but hey, biomass occurs.

There is one thing I'd like to clear up, though. I called the Tominack/Stoller contribution a "revenant story", not "reverent". A revenant is a ghost that appears to a friend or loved one soon after death to deliver some message.

Funny thing is, this happened to me once before, courtesy of one of the Big Boys, no less. In a letter to The Outsiders. I called the Aurakles "Furry Eyefuls", a reference to one of Stephen Cosgrove's Serendipity books. But by the time it got to print, it had become "furry eyeballs". Eh!

Lesson to fanboys and letter hacks: don't make obscure references.

Okay, about the second and third issues:

I was especially impressed by #3's cover. Good balance, and exceptional use of color. The belt straps and arm and leg bands were a nice touch. "Stand Clear" - very clever. And yes, I did notice that she

I'd previously seen hints of your work in the Jabberwocky catalogue. The belly dancer is nice, but

sorry, I won't buy Goodies.

Ted Sheppard's art is noticeably different between the two issues. He's using a thicker, darker line now. Or would it be a smaller original art? Which is better? Ahhh, apples and oranges. But he could really use a good letterer. Quirky art is one thing, but quirky lettering can be a pain.

Brian Sutton's art is much improved by Joe Rosales' layouts and your inks. There's a lot of character development squeezed into a very few pages. And once you get past the painfully obvious and mostly irrelevant - jokes about mud-wrestling,

there's a good story under there.

Riley's doing better. The art is sometimes still crowded, but not as often. The dialogue flows a lot better. And he's playing some interesting games with the plot. If Uhrtar is unimportant, why is there a member of a titled family there, and if it's unarmed, why the reference to a weapons hut? Not all is as it seems.

One particular compliment: In a "formula" war story, Hulton would be The Kid Who Gets Killed. Riley has intentionally avoided that cliché, I hope.

And one niggling complaint: In chapter one, the D.A.'s are lounging around on the hulls of their tanks after exercises in the desert heat. I have a photo of an Afrika Korps tanker frying a egg on the hull of his panzer. Ira's arms would get more than dark if she leaned on that hot metal!

Dear Furry People,

Greetings from a brand-new reader! Furrlough #3 arrived at my comic shop this week (at last! - but it was worth the wait!), so I've spent the last couple of days in the throes of anthropomorphilia. The only real problem so far is the storylines I've jumped into the middle of, but I'm keeping an eye out for #'s 1 and 2, so I shouldn't be scratching my head much Without a further ado, here are some longer. random thoughts on #3.

Stosstrupp strikes me as an intriguing little drama. All right, so it's derivative, it could have been done just as well using humans instead of critters, and all the rest of the rigmarole. It's still an enjoyable action story, and I like it, so there! The background detail and history fit together well,

although the bit about the Swiss scientists and the cheese gave me a good laugh. Some of the international goings-on were uncomfortably close to recent real-life events: has Ted Sheppard been sneaking looks into Steve Gallacci's crystal ball?

I have just one small nit to pick. A glitch seems to have crept into the artwork somewhere along the line, producing dark lines and the odd smudge. It looks like the pages might have been run through a copier with the contrast set too high. It's not much, but some of the fine detail is obscured, and the clarity of the lettering definitely suffers a bit. Oh well, better luck next time.

The next story, Rainy Season, has something hideously, horrendously, horribly wrong with it. I'm sorry, but it's glaringly obvious. WHY IS THE STORY ONLY FOUR PAGES LONG? I'm not sure why I like it so much: the scenario is nondescript: I haven't a clue what's going on, or who's who, where, when, why; the final plot twist has long grey whiskers down to here; and the mistranslation joke has long grey whiskers on its long grey whiskers. It doesn't matter: the art looks good, the characters hang together nicely ( I didn't say a word about mud-wrestling, honest - you just heard me thinking it!), the pacing of the story is just right, and the funny stuff is well timed. All right, then, so that's why I like it! I hope this is part of a continuing story, and not just a one-off appearance.

And finally, but far from least, is Riley's Why Desert Winds Howl. I'm a bit ambivalent about this one. Most of my comments would be a repeat of John Sain's letter, so I'll let him speak for me. I dunno: maybe it's the missing-part-one problem, but I can't quite figure out what's going on. The action jumps about so much, leaving me totally confused as to who's who. Also, the tone of this episode is a bit uneven, skipping into light-hearted banter in the middle of fast-paced action sequences. And I still don't know who the two characters in the jeep were. Maybe everything will sort itself out when I've got the rest of the story and I know who everyone is. We'll see. By the way, shouldn't the last page have come at the beginning?

Before I go, just a few words about the cover. This is a very nice piece of work indeed. If there's a story to go with it, I'd like to see it sometime. On one condition: as long as there is no mention at all about turning left at Albuquerque!

All in all, then, **Furrlough #3** is a definite success. Three very different stories, and three very different art styles. I'm looking forward to the next issue, and all the good stuff I'm sure you've got line up for it. Until then,

About the first three issues of **Furrlough**: Bravo! I can remember when all the old anthropomorphics series died off, way back when. I was convinced that the concept of anthropomorphics comics and stories had bit the dust. **Furrlough** has quite thankfully

proven me wrong.

Now for some comments on the stories. Stosstruppen is my definite favorite in the mag so far, both because of the great story and characters (don't change a thing about Eva) and that somebody has finally done a comic with Germans as the good guys. Aside from Desert Peach by MU, most Germans in comics have been shown as drooling fiends. Somebody finally takes a look at the other side of the coin. And having read some German history, I think I have a little better understanding of the whole situation, i.e., the near civil war in Germany in the twenties between the mainly ex-Army Freikorps and the radical Spartakists. certainly hope Stosstruppen is going to be around for a while, as I'm getting interested in Karl and Eva. By the by, according to the bio of her, Eva is only 17 or 18. She seems a little hard-bitten for a teenager.

Ferae Bestiae - I'm with Mr. Sain 100% on this. Original and intelligent, as well as captivating, are the words that best come to mind. The two stories that have shown up so far appear to be well crafted. This is the best treatment of Roman legionnaires I have seen since Harry Turtledove's Videssos cycle. Long may the legion march.

The other two favorites of mine so far are the *Empires* story in issue 1, and the rather unlucky ladies in issues 1 and 3 with their tank. One wonders if they'll ever get their air conditioner working again, or at least get 'Baby' out of the mudhole.

One thing really about *Empires* - it looked to yours truly like there were - can I be mistaken? - humans in one or two panels. I would not mind seeing a story that combined humans and anthropomorphics. It would be a change of pace, as far as I'm concerned.
