Despite my retailer's best efforts, his distributor did not send him #'s 6 and 7, or Space Wolf #2. I'd be up Rio Guano if it weren't for Ed Zolna and the other nice folks at Mailbox Books, the blessings of St. Guinefort be upon them.

Okay, let's start out by causing some trouble.

I noticed Ted Sheppard's plug for his Girls of Stosstrupp portfolio a while back. Fortunately for him this is neither the time nor the place to rant on at length about the proliferation of "gitcheroxoff" publications in an industry that was, a decade ago, struggling to gain recognition as real literature and real art. However, the whole thing does seem out of character. Gef. v. R. struck me as someone who does not like to be looked upon as just another nice set of furry tits. Ted, a word to the wise: don't play with your characters' heads. First chance they get, they'll stomp you. Just ask that crazy Barr woman.

This brings up another interesting. A disproportionate number of features prominently (double-entendre intended) feature females. The question is, how many of these are politically-correct expressions of confidence that a woman can do the same job as a man, and how many are politically questionable male fantasies about furry babes with maximum firepower? Deer John,

A mixed bag, overall, as is any anthology series... but I like most of what's been between the covers so far. Before getting to the stories themselves, though - I've heard a couple of comments made here and there about whether Furrhough (and Wild Life as well) might be better as an anthology, the way it is now, or as a "totating feature" title, as Critters was in its last days. If such a move is being seriously considered, I'd like to cast a vote strongly in favor of the anthology format. Personally, I think it's the only way to go if you're doing a title containing a mixture of stories from various writers and artists. The "rotating feature" concept may give each artist more pages to work with for each installment, but it removes the incentive to pick up the title on a continuous basis, and tends to put the brakes on wide exposure for newer artists and writers as people quit buying the title on a continuous basis and start picking up only those issues that contain their personal favorites. I'm firmly convinced that this was one of the causes of Critters' ultimate demise.

Anyway - you asked for comments on the last couple of issues, so here goes: (If I can go back somewhat further for a moment, though, I must note that Joe Rosales' "Furry Roman Empire" series has been a favorite of mine since issue #1 and deserves an honorable mention, as do Brian Sutton's pieces and Toivo Rovainen's Hairlift in #6.)

Stossrupp - What can I say, it's also been a consistent favorite since issue #1. Granted, on the surface it's a fairly standard war story... but there's a definite appeal in seeing Sheppard take the well-worn (and somewhat overused) "woman in a man's army" idea and put a 180-degree spin on it, trapping Unteroffizer Karl Mueller in a women's platoon. There seems to be a bit of a relationship budding between him and Eva; it would be interesting to see the personal angle explored a bit. (Obviously the chances for romantic dalliances are slim to none in their current situation, but that's not necessarily what I'm thinking of. For example: isn't Karl just a \_bit\_ uneasy at being surrounded by all those women, in circumstances where neither he nor they have all that much privacy?)

Dog Starr - Pleasantly silly - kind of a cross between Looney Tunes and old Flash Gordon serials. The art seemed kind of flat in Menace of the Skin Suckers (Furrlough #7), but picked up a better sense of perspective in "Attack of the Atomic Brain Spiders" (Furrlough #8)... nothing wrong with Pat Dolan's ability to sustain a gag, though!

Officer Talk - It isn't easy to make an extended conversation between two people visually interesting... Riley manages it nicely by having the characters physically react to each other, constantly changing the "camera" angle, and generally avoiding the deadly "talking heads" syndrome. The conversation itself was engaging, as well; a nice break from the "blood and thunder" of earlier chapters. Only two criticisms, both to do with the second half in Furrlough #8: (1) It needed a title panel to set it apart from the Stosstrupp chapter... a minor editorial glitch. (2) The lines on page 30 - "I've already taken 12 pages of this story" / "Don't we have a maximum?" / "We can always 'continue." ... Please, Riley, don't do this. Characters who are aware that they're in the pages of a comic book break the flow of the story in particularly jarring fashion; it may be an amusing gag in a newspaper comic strip, but I thought it was totally out of place in this type of story.

Simple Extradition - Nice twist on the ending... And a nicely distinctive character in Tina Keuhs; you don't see very many winged furries around. (Those wings must be a major

problem when she goes shopping for new clothes, though.)

Colonel Bogie - Well... I'd rather not commit myself too firmly one way or another until 1 see another installment or two and get a better idea of where Mel. is going with this. But if you want my initial reactions: (1) "Woman in a man's army"... Hasn't this been done before? (2) I know Mel. is capable of much better artwork than this...

I picked up Furrlough #9 and Hit the Beach '93 this weekend and liked them, so I thought I'd write you a few words about them.

I actually saw Hit the Beach a couple weeks ago, but only the deluxe edition was on sale; packaging means nothing to me and the content didn't seem worth \$4.95, so I left it on the shelf with some regret. I was happy to see Saturday that there was a cheaper version, and one with an even better cover. Cool. And cruel. This is the second beautiful Phil Morrissey cover in recent months; excellent coloring, drawing, theme in both. I suppose the existence of two editions explains why he got no credit anywhere in the issue (and why Brian Sutton's pinup looks a lot like a submissions guideline page). Pity. Anyway, I hope you'll keep using his work.


Pinups aren't my thing, but I thought Shon Howell's was attractive among the cheesecake-y ones and Jim Groat's and Pat Dolan's were the funniest.

In Harm's Way looks like a filler borrowed from Furrlough, but it's not bad. Any story that gets a sargeant major soaked is OK with me. Dog Starr was an amusing turnabout.

Wilcken's Beach Blanket Blitzkrieg! is my favorite piece of the issue. With a title character (and superhero premise) like that, you'd expect the title character to be an impossibly pneumatic caricature instead of a pretty kitty with a personality. I hope we'll see more stories of her in Genus - maybe that "last issue" story with the splinters, for example? The feminist rhetoric is laid on a little thick, but used to good effect.

And Ted Sheppard's story is a pleasant little Stosstrupp piece, more to my taste than the shooty ones.

Furrlough isn't quite as good. Nice Verré cover, but Risuko looks like a runaway from Genus: not only does Risuko's posing make the story look like an excuse for a series of butt shots (and isn't she cuuuute?), but the plot doesn't seem to make sense. Kirby must be faking sleep, but why's he so careless as to let Risuko scatter the cards? And what good would a larger monster have done? Weak punchline. Fantastic Panic is probably a good story, but the manga style is one I don't care for. (Hard to read mirror-Japanese too...)



Perry's Under Realm is pretty good stuff, but jeez, doesn't whatever machine he used for lettering have spell checker on it? "Terroring", "theif" (once he got it right), missing apostrophes everywhere, plus unspellcheckable typos like "She's" for "she'll". That quibble aside, this has the makings of a good standard adventure and I look forward to more. I especially like Drey; she's so smug. Nice double pun in *Treasure Chest*.

Love the cover! Tom Verré is one of the best. He could easily become one of the "gods" of anthropomorphics...if only he could manage the difficult bits...(I'm still heartbroken that I'll never see Lesbian Foxes in Hovertanks, or his treatment of Rhudiprrt...) Ah, but this cover: Beautiful, just beautiful!

Back to Chris Tennaro and John DiGiorgio: the Risuko story is a lot of fun. I like the 'sexy pinup" aspect of the story — the last panel on page 6 is an eye-stabber! best part is Risuko's personality: brassy and sassy and too callow to be believed! Ready for war? No! (Nor, I must say, is the war ready for her!) Kirby's right: she cheated...but she cheated well!

Fred Perry's two chapters of Under Realm are the prizes of this issue. Magnificent! I'm also very happy to see a "mephitisoid" finally use his "secret weapon." (Marvel Comics will never have the class, I betcha, to let "Mam' selle Hepzibah" cook up a BRRAP the way Serch does here!) Hove the characterization, too: Serch's shame and embarrassment at having done what he'd done is absolutely endearing! Dennis Clark's pinups at frontispiece and end-page are nifty! (I know I'm overusing the wordy "nifty" but it's a good word nonetheless...) I especially like the "mixed signals" in the frontispiece: a "come-hither" smile from a nude warrior...who has her weapons close to hand anyway. Inspiring, yes! That sort of "paradoxical" visual image, I think, exemplary of the sense of conflict - of "cognitive dissonance" - that make fuzzy fandom so attractive to me and so many other people. The character is a warrior: no she's a lover: no she's both. The characters are animals: no they're people: no, they're both. The both/ neither dichotomy forces the mind to discard preconceived notions, giving the art a fresh, startling, and highly attractive appearance.

I may be a registered Marvel Zombie, but I do want to say: Hooray for Antarctic!

Until next month, keep those letters, fan art, and submissions coming!

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
