Dear Folks at Antarctic Press Responsible For Those Wonderful Furry Publications,

I thought I'd take some time this afternoon and write you a letter about your various furry comics. I only discovered AP last year, so I've had to catch up a bit with your back issues. I have been generally pleased with everything I've bought-which speaks for the quality of the editorial staff as much as it does for the quality of the stories and art. Since I do much of my comic buying through the mail, I must go on impressions gleaned from catalogs or titles in making my purchase decisions. Nothing I've bought from you has caused me to regret one dime of my money. And I am expressing my confidence in your ability to continue to produce quality by resubscribing to Furrlough and Genus. One of the letters columns in Furrlough a number of issues ago said that you were interested in hearing from readers on what they liked and disliked in each magazine. I thought it was interesting that comparisons are made to Critters and how they folded because they failed to listen to what the readers were saying. Frankly, any comic that manages 50 issues in the relatively restricted small-press anthropomorphic comic books market must have done something right. I hope all your comics fail at least as well as Critters did.

As for my own likes and dislikes, I make no claim to be a particularlygood art critic, but there are some pieces I really like in each anthololgy. There is nothing that interests me so little that I fail to read it at all (as was true of several pieces in Critters). Anyway, here are some thoughts:

Furrlough: My favorite series is most certainly "Stosstrupp". I don't know why I like this story so much, whether it's Ted Sheppard's artwork, Eva Von Reizend's bloodthirsty German stoicism, the wry humor or something else. Anyway, I've missed it these last few issues, though hopefully it's because the issues are coming too frequently for Ted to get in an episode more often and not because he no longer has time to draw the series. Joe Rosales' Roman adventures are also neat, though it looks like he has his hands full with the "Wildlifers" stories. I like the characters in Riley's war stories, though it would be nice to understand the background of the war. As it stands, I don't really understand what they're fighting about. Among the more recent stories, I like Pat Kelley's "Watering Hole" series, though it's not clear yet where the story is going. I can be patient. The same is true for Fred Perry's "Underrealm" and Jordan Greywolf's "The Walker". If my pleas make any difference to the artists and writers, I would beg them not to leave us poor readers hanging. Jim Groat's short war vignettes have also been amusing, particularly "Recoiless" in #11.

Wild Life: Again, I liked the vast majority of the stories in this series, though I must say that the stories of Mange and his siblings by Davies and Sutherland were my favorites, both in Wild Life and in Genus. I also enjoy the "Wildlifers" stories and "Crossways". I liked the

latter well enough to buy the other "Crossways" stories that have been published independently. The "Vixy Vid" story in #4 was so true. I wish my daughter was old enough to appreciate the irony. Unfortunately, she is still at an age where sophisticated sales techniques go right to her head. "Buffalo Wings" is a bit strange, especially flipping back and forth between the serialized version and his two issue series. I realize that they are not supposed to be the same story, but they are close enough that I get a little confused with the romances that either are or are not going, depending on the version.

Genus: Very enjoyable adult humor. Besides the stories of Mange's family, I liked Kjartan Arnorsson's "Mink" and Brian Sutton's various tales. I've seen other parts of "Amy's Adventures" in Furplay and I think they will do well in Genus. I wasn't too sure at first about the "all-bondage" issue. Frankly, leather, spikes and whips don't do much for me. I've never quite understood why it is neccessary to be tied up during sex. That implies thatsexual encounters are so unpleasant that one of the parties has to be tied up to cooperate. Nonetheless, the three stories were all entertaining, particularly "Good Sports". And are we ever going to find out what happened to poor Dr. Nector, or are we just left to imagine his

Of your other furry pubs, I would single out three for particular kudos. The first is Albedo, which was the "tail" that first got me interested in anthropomorphic fiction five years ago. I am so pleased to finally find it again and to see that you are planning to continue publishing Steve Gallacci's work. The second is Shanda the Panda. I have enjoyed this tale of adult anthropomorphic relationships as much as Omaha the Cat Dancer, and I think Mike Curtis has great potential as a writer. The reason I say this is that my initial attraction to any graphic art story is the artist's style, and despite playing musical artists, the story has been sufficiently engaging to overcome the changes in style with each issue. As an aside, the artwork has been great each issue anyway, but changes did come as something of a surprise. This is one I would subscribe to if you offered subscriptions. The third is the new series by Carole Curtis and Terrie Smith- Katmandu. The sexuality is woven well into the storyline and Terrie Smith's drawings capture the moods of the characters perfectly. Most of the other "adults only" stuff published these days deals with sex either humorously or cynically or with violence. While I may laugh at Mange's older sister when she is caught naked with her boyfriend at her own birthday party, it is not particularly erotic. Katmandu is erotic, in the best sense of the word, as are Shanda and Omaha.

Anyway, the only way a publishing house can maintain this level of quality across the board is by having good editors running the show. So in the end, my compliments to Ben and Joe Dunn, Shon Howell and all of the others at AP who are responsible for making these artists available to me. Good luck to you.



## Guidelines for Submissions

### FURRLOUGH · WILD LIFE · Genus

- 1. We are now accepting submissions for three anthologies.
  - Furrlough monthly action adventure anthology (not limited to military.)

    Rating is G to PG-13
  - Wild Life bi-monthly general-theme anthology geared towards humor and slice-of- life stories. Rating is G to soft R.
  - •Genus bi-monthly anthology of material of a more adult nature (sort of a turbo charged Wild Life.) Rating is R to X.
- 2. Minimum length of submissions is one page. Maximum length is 12 pages. For serialized stories, we prefer chapters to be six to eight pages in length.
- When presenting all story ideas, please submit pencilled samples, story guidelines and /or scripts for editorial comment. We may need to request revisions or changes and this will make both our jobs easier.
- 4. Single page illustrations and cover illustrations are and cover illustrations are invited For covers, please submit a concept sketch or xerox of pencils for editorial comment. We can handle color work if you do not wish to.
- No stories containing ring-tailed lemurs will be accepted for Furrlough no exceptions (even scantily-clad ones!)
- Copyrights of characters and stories will be held by their rightful creators. All artwork will be returned after publication. We are not responsible for any material lost or damaged by mail carriers.
- 7. Original art (or stats) should be in by the deadline date. This is not a set rule, but it makes our job
  - 8. Payment will be made in accordance with the production/payment schedule. Payment will be sent out about 30 days after publication.

- 9. We have the right to make editorial revisions to submitted stories.
  - For series, extra pages of character profiles, situations or historical data, and technical data are encouraged.
- 11. We will not censor work, but we will not accept blatant pornography. There is no exceptions to this rule. (some sex and/or nudity violence will be acceptable if we feel it advances the story.)
- 12. Name and address must be included on the back of each page.
