I liked what I saw and eventually discovered titles like **Wild Life**, **Furrlough**, and **Genus** in an issue of **Previews**. I finally got around to ordering a few, as well as discovering a back copy or two in my local comic shop and I've been hooked ever since.

While I missed out on the first run of Tank Vixens and Aztec Anthropomorphic Amazons, I've heard enough good things about them to give 'em a try when the opportunity arises. I was able to catch StarJacks when it came out and I must disagree with Mr. Cohen entirely - the artwork was fine, the story was better than many movies I've seen and as for the skunk's

accent, it was just as good as Pepe Le Pew's and people have been loving him for 50 years.

In regards to Furrlough itself, I am really enjoying "Here Comes a Candle". The fairy-"tail" references are the most original storyline I have ever seen and the story itself is quite entertaining. "Zaibatsu Tears" also deserves mention - the artwork is fantastic and the plot and characters are straight out of a Shadowrun or Cyberpunk adventure.
