Dear Penguins,

Well, now that I've been labelled Letterhack-par-Excellence, I ought to get to that letter I've been meaning to write since mid-September.

Furrlough #21: "Zaibatsu Tears" is quite well-drawn (nice cover, too). I like the way we see Pi drawn from all sorts of angles, the way her fur ruffles when they breeeep her, the futuristic windows and other backgrounds. The plot strikes me as pretty routine, and I don't even read all that much in the 'indentured company servant' SF line, but it's competently done.

"Here Comes a Candle" is, as usual, the top story of the issue. The puns come thickly this time, with some neat touches like 'Jackal Anton' (that son of a bitch, incidentally, is perhaps the most attractively drawn character so far) and 'seal of approval', some groaners like 'fur sale or rent'. 'The biggest pair of boots I've ever seen' gave me the biggest laugh. I also like the family names, like the Strawhovel pigs and Lord Esterbunny. All the characters, even the ones seen briefly, have an admirable solidity to them.

There's a lot going on in "Mandala", and I would have liked to be thrown into it a little nearer the start. How did Stacy get in to this? What's the meaning of the scene with the ant? What are the trilobites supposed to tell us? The Tibetlike milieu is an interesting one. The drawing is good but the ungulates' faces are rather unexpressive.

Furrlough #22: It's about time your top story gets a cover, now that I think of it. I can't just keep repeating the superlatives, so I'll just say that the first page was particularly hilarious, the flowering and withering of love on page 4 was elegant, the scene on page 6 was charming, the smeary lettering was annoying, and 'I think I can' was funny.

"Zaibatsu Tears" evokes much the same thoughts as last time. A couple of touches I liked were the 'no cats' graffiti and the echoes of the 'borg secret handshake and 'I'll break both your arms'.

"Guardian Knights" isn't as polished as the other pieces in this issue, and it's too early to tell how the plot's going to be; I'll reserve judgment on this one. The magical eat bunny burglar seems both incompetent (easily surprised) and arrogant; I bet she takes him out easily in the next installment.

"One Rainy Night in a Foxhole": an entertaining variation on the argument of the body parts.

And a quite striking frontispiece, one of Bryce Nakagawa's best pieces.

Furrlough #23: Great cover for the military fetishists, and not bad even if you're not. In "Here Comes a Candle" the grimness is beginning to come to the forefront and sometimes clashes with the sillier humor. 'Why do they not simply tell their servants to bring them some?' boy, you can see that Thomas could have used a few more years of Galen's education. And how pleased he is with himself when he says, '...and he had no answer for that, I can tell you!' I suppose, considering 'Let them eat cake', that it's not quite the cartoony absurdity I first thought it. Galen's satire is sharp, and indeed outdoes the narration box's text. The charity events are wicked, and could apply to many 'charities' today that exist mainly for fundraising. But many of the best parts are still purely silly stuff: the Liberty Fairy, tobacco leaf pie (a tasty but deadly dish, as Fractured Fairy Tales fans know), 'out-of-the-whey places'.

"UnderRealm" is nice but short. To be concluded? Only the current story, I hope.

"Risuko": bleah. The double-entendre beginning is forced and unfunny, Risuko's tail comes out of her butt and her mouth is unattractive...at least this time the brief plot sorta makes sense and is not just a vehicle for furry cheesecake.

"Uni-Universe" is a pleasant vignette, "Stosstrupp" is interesting and ominous, and "Legend" is a properly unpleasant vignette.

It's been a pleasure rereading those issues for this letter, but I think I'll try to be more prompt in future.

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
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
