You wanted letters of comment, so here's one for Furrlough #24.

"Zaibatsu Tears" was a good story, but the ending wherein the protagonist is hesitant to blow away the bad guy, then does it anyway because it's "the right thing to do" is somewhat cliched. The inclusion of first person narration, however, does help to keep the story flowing smoothly. For once though I wouldn't mind a story where a character does give in to temptation and takes the antagonist's offer, By the way, was it me or did Pi's eyes suddenly enlarge on the first panel of the second page? Despite all that, I wouldn't mind seeing further stories featuring Pi, although I doubt the corporation has set her completely free. If today's record companies can manipulate the public into buying millions of copies of albums by Garth Brooks, Whitney Houston, Michael Bolton, etc., then it should be a cinch for a future corporation to keep tabs on a cybernetic furry. "Once a slave to the corporation, always a slave to the corporation" says no one in particular.

"Iron Panther"- Furry space bounty hunters? I like it so far and it has nicely flowing first person narration. Awaiting part two.

One suggestion I'd like to make to the creators of the two stories I've mentioned above (and to everyone else out there) is if they want to see some really tough, gritty first person narration, then pick up any book by Andrew Vachss. Particularly his book Shella which has one of the most disturbing opening paragraphs I've ever read. Be forewarned - his books are populated with characters with very little (if any) redeeming social values. Oh, I forget I mentioned it. Ignore me- everybody else does. Back to the comment.

Part one of "Guardian Knights" was a bit confusing. Part to was an incomprehensible mess. I'll give it one final chance but I already feel you should dump this story.

"Here Comes a Candle" continues to be my favorite story in Furrlough. What more needs to be said? I'd like to ask one question: if and when "Candle" reaches its conclusion, will AP publish a collected edition of this exceptional tale?

Dear Furrlough creators and editors:

I've been buying this book for years, so it's high time that I wrote in to tell you how much I enjoy **Furrlough** and all AP's anthropomorphic titles. Issue #24 is especially worthy of comment, so here we go!

"Zaibatsu Tears": It's a tribute to Richard Bartrop's storytelling skills that I enjoyed this so much, even though the ending was a foregone conclusion. I hope Bartrop isn't finished with Pi and her world yet, because there's a lot of potential for future stories here. Pi's narration points out one unresolved plotline: 'I never did find out what the suit was doing in the undercity, or why Dolf killed him'. I'd also like to see Pi take action against the corporation whose policies have cost her so much.

"Here Comes a Candle": What compliment can I give Mary Hanson-Roberts that the readers of **Furrlough** haven't already given her? Part 8 is one of the funnier chapters ('Let us hope Sir Jack is a wise ass', indeed). After this storyline is over, I hope that both Hanson-Roberts and AP will consider giving "Candle" its own title.

"The Iron Panther": Milton Teruel and Randy Zimmerman (which is the writer and which is the artist?) have produced a solid, entertaining piece of work here. S'mballa is more likable than I would expect a hard-bitten bounty hunter to be. Oddity: Gore says to his potential victim, 'Say goodnight, Gracie'. Burns & Allen fans show up in the strangest places!

"Guardian Knights": First, I should say that Tygger's cover art is very impressive. Second, I'm sorry but this is the most frustrating item in Furrlough. The first two parts of the story have been published, but they're so fragmented that I can't evaluate "Knights" any more than John DiGiorgio could in #24's letter column. (Only one character has even been named so far!) It's too bad, because "Knights" looks like exactly the kind of story I'd enjoy if Tygger and Dean Graf would give me a chance. I've heard that "Guardian Knights" might get its own title from another publisher; I hope Graf and Tygger do a longer, more substantial story for Furrlough before they move on.

That's all for now; I look forward to future issues of Furrlough. Later!


