Universes of Change

Ten years ago, those of us who were reading superhero comics, principally Marvel and DC books, were always greeted with the same characters in the same situations. Nothing really changed; the old groups might slowly change members, the new groups come and go, but the characters were constant.

Of course, this annoyed a lot of us, who were demanding more out of comics. "We want REAL stories! We want CONSEQUENCES! We want to know what would happen if...!" we would tell our friends, our favorite editors in letters, and (if we were lucky) our local comics retailer. For the most part, however, little changed; editors didn't want to alter a formula which had worked for twenty years.

Those who wanted more from comics had few options open to them. Those, like myself, who had limited access to comics of any kind gave up altogether and went on to other media. Those in major cities were sometimes able to sample alternative titles (ELFQUEST, CEREBUS, ALBEDO and the undergrounds). Some fans even managed to stay loyal to their favorites despite their limitations.

Then, not too long ago, things began to move. CRISIS ON INFINITE EARTHS. SECRET WARS. Slowly, doubtfully at first, the writers, artists, and editors began shaking down their universes. The X-Men "died". Robin REALLY died. Slowly but surely, new ideas and character development became the norm rather than the exception. With the superhero boom sparked by the birth of Image, pressure rose on the older, established companies to keep providing more new and innovative ideas to keep sales up.

Now, in the current deflating comics market, we have a surfeit of change. Ideas and innovations have been replaced by gimmicks and promos. Every month, the characters which have held our loyalty for thirty years may be redefined, recast, or even totally eliminated... and put back in place the month after that. The Spider-Man who has quite literally been around ALL MY LIFE turns out to be a clone- what's more, a clone supposedly destroyed in a furnace. Superman dies, comes back, thinks he's dead, fakes his death. The X-Men changed history for four months, then changed it right back. Stability is a rare commodity in many comics; in some it is lost altogether.

On the other hand, there are books outside of superherodom which provide a good balance of story, character, and art, which provide growth and change at a more realistic rate; neither too slow for the revisionist, nor too fast for the traditionalist. AP happens to have a few choice examples: NINJA HIGH SCHOOL, GOLD DIGGER, TIGERS OF TERRA, and ALBEDO. Other good books, new and old, include THIEVES AND KINGS, SCUD the DISPOSABLE ASSASSIN, NEXUS, REPLACEMENT GOD, and most of the manga translations available from AP, Viz, and Studio Proteus.

In this period of constant shock-tactics in the mainstream comics media, it can be comforting to find a read which doesn't include a Life-Changing Decision in every issue. From thick to thin, from static to chaotic, the books which prosper will be the ones which provide character growth, story continuity, and reader interest in measured an appropriate amounts. Those books which rely on either an excess or a total lack of change will suffer; those which value substance and excellence over style and glamour will come out on top.

I intend to stick with the winners.

Pat Kelley's unique style grabbed me with the cover of Furrlough #13, and the story inside nailed me. I loved it immediately. Everything about it: the plight of Prof. Washbang, the personalities of his fellow exiles (only recently have I been able to prevent myself from laughing out loud at the thought of the names 'Ron Konkoma' and 'Ooday Twallet'), the range of characters among the law enforcement officers (I wondered how long it would take for Grotch's obsessions to jeopardize him), the ruthless machinations of the pitiless Smog (although, now that he has made a- gasp- contract with Ja-Teth, he might end up being worthy of pity himself. Smog you'll be sorrreeee...)

I guess you get the picture. It has been quite a while since I did the wide-eyed raving fanboy routine, but it's been even longer than that since I found a comic worthy of said routine. Small-press class-act publishers like you, Antarctic, seem to deliver the majority of titles I like and it behooves one to let a publisher that cares about its books know that the reader cares about them, too. In a manner of speaking, I have done this already. I got the opportunity to meet Pat Kelley last year at ConFurence 5 (where I bought a lot of his sketches) and again this year at ConFurence 6 (where he did a sketch for me- thanks Pat!) but if I don't actually write Antarctic Press and tell them, it probably doesn't count as much. So I'm writing to tell you. Mission accomplished.

I've been reading books by AP for some time now and I finally decided it was time to write in and tell you guys what a great bunch of books you are producing. I have been reading anthropomorphics for a couple of years now and I have to say some of the best are in Furrlough and the sadly discontinued Wild Life. I agree with Mr. Causey's letter in issue #32... and from the general theme of the letters I see in Furrlough. I have to wonder why sales were too low on Wild Life. When I first started reading Furrlough, the military aspect of it was what interested me, but I have to say that of the two books, Wild Life was my favorite, because versatility was more present. Well, no use crying over spilled milk, eh?

Back to Furrlough. There is something I think I have to say, and I know other readers will probably have the same opinion. "Here Comes a Candle" really deserves to be collected or have its own comic. If something is still extremely popular after 16 sections in a monthly anthology, I think it has the legs to stand on its own. Mary Hanson-Roberts is a wonderful storyteller.

In regards to issue #30, I have to say that I was pleasantly surprised by "Scavengers". The layout and style speak of good things to come from Mark Moore. I await future installments eagerly. Those guys at the top and bottom of the second page are quite mysterious...

To wrap things up, here are a couple of things I'd like to see in future issues of Furrlough: How about occasional interviews with some of the artists/writers, and maybe a little blurb at the end of the issue that highlights things coming up in future issues? Well, I'll write at you latergot stuff to do.

And now, a Tales of the Fehnnik letter ... An open letter to the folks at AP:

The local comic book store is trying to reformat their image, as they've dropped a bunch of the sex titles and have initiated an ad campaign celebrating wholesome comics. Although I don't usually patronize retail

comic outlets, I thought I'd breeze through and see what's up.

Apparently they were telling the truth when they said they endorsed good quality comics. I snagged a copy of Tales of the Fehnnik by Elin Winkler and Pat Kelley, and I'm pleasantly surprised at the warmth, humor, and appeal of the book. In my opinion, this publication presents the best new "furry" story to hit the stands in a long, long time.

One of the best aspects is that characters Zerista and Shayerik inhabit a completely different culture with its own unique architecture. fashion, and customs. I find this much more appealing and engaging than the usual tired retread of contemporary Western culture and opinion. masquerading as an "alien" continuity or universe. Co-authors Winkler and Kelley have done a great job in projecting a different style of life, where beauty is measured by graceful ears, martial training is expected of both men and women, and marriage is a political, not romantic, convenience.

The architecture looks interesting as well, suggesting lots of classical Greek and Roman structures, with the additional presence of Italian canals. Actually, I'd like to see more of it, as the art in this regard is a bit sparse. Hopefully, future editions of ToTF will show us more about the type of cities in which these people live their lives.

One aspect of the artwork which I find particularly appropriate is the artistic construction of the children. Many artists make the mistake of drawing kids as if they were just very small scaled-down adults, but this is entirely wrong. Young people have their own expressive proportions, large heads and eyes, small faces, short arms and legs, and often, a small rounded torso. Good cartoonists recognize and incorporate these differences. ToTF is a good example of this ability, producing furry children cute enough to hug.

One minor technical complaint- varying the font size from panel to panel (and even within the panel) is very distracting, and draws attention to the process instead of the story. A great story should have consistent lettering, to further enhance the product. I would recommend careful layout, to provide sufficient space for lettering, and eliminate the need to force-feed the text.

Once again, let me commend the Antarctic Team for creating a delightful addition to the genre, More furry books should be like this, and I hope sales justify further editions of ToTF.
