Podunk Falls has very little property to damage and no one in their right mind would want to stay there.































































(Re: Furrlough #63) Now that "Tiger Orange" has had its turn at the digital chopping block, only a few other fairly consistent stories are up for covers

I'd like to comment on the frontispiece a little more than I usually do. Why, with the addition of huge, sometimes grotesque, ears, are manga-styled characters suddenly assumed to be furry? The barrier between human with animal traits and animal with human traits is definitely fuzzy, but don't you think this touches a little nearer to, say, costume party, than pure furry? Then again, s'pose I'm being a little critical of furry ethics. In itself, the art is very nice.

"Tiger Orange" is getting formulaic, like most manga I've

seen. More yelling, lots of firepower, simple ideas and plot.

"Artist's Fantasy" is good for a chuckle or two. Heh!

"Love, Death & Money" is just about the best story of the

issue. Another light-duty funny animal excursion into silliness. The plottwist was, at least, surprising. They should've had a moral at the end. One question, though.... I'm assuming this is a fairly middle-age-era storytale setting. Why's the barker for the auction using a microphone?

'Aardwolf Agency" is best for its humor, and an okay short overall. The art is just a bit wobbly. In a strange way it compliments the short and jaunty storyline.

'Theriopangrams' are improving for what they are, which is splash pages. Very nice art on this one.

Once again, I wade through the humidity of Central Pennsylvania to write you my per-issue review, critique and compliment of Furrlough. I believe it's #65 this time. Cover looks as loud as the last issue that featured the "Bronze Age" thing. The artist's use of differing backgrounds seems to work very nicely here. Sometimes I get the impression that he won't draw anything less than two or more scenes happening at one time. Bill Fitts is drawing from Vietnam, obviously. Hate the gun. Doesn't look as cool as anything that was in Vietnam, such as the M-14, M-16, AK-47, M-60, etc. Wonder if there's any story to the military furries?

This particular "Bronze Age" story, like all of them in a way, gets a little bit beyond the reader, as if it expects them to know at least a rudimentary history and background to this densely packed series of comics. I don't like it for some reason.

I would like to submit 153, 872 votes for "Full Knight Gear" It's rapidly becoming the best story there is in the history of Furrlough since it's been in your hands. Without any more "Ninjara" and not a lot of "Heebas" to give it comparable competition, "FKG" is definitely the topper for the last few issues you've put out. Enormous amount of fun to read, although it's just a little irritating to find the sequence of the word balloons. Art is phenomenal. Note: scene in which the slain Prince is picked up by the Zombie Wrangler is the single brightest idea I've seen in the pages of Furrlough. Much better than anything the X-men could think up to bring back a superhero.

'Eye for an Eye"; Bad, bad, bad. Very bad. Very, very bad. Awaiting more next time. Please do tell the guy who does "Heebas" to do more of it. And-- Ninjara, Ninjara, Ninjara!

"The Otters" looks like something I'd be more likely to find in The Comic News, (an actual, monthly publication of newspaper cartoons) being a scrappily drawn, slightly stupid, mostly weird or quirky gag story. (I see nothing resembling otters here- I think they all look like ducks, except for the cucumber/sheep.)

"Tobias Wah" is not good. It just isn't. Like I have repeated a few times, panel borders, however they may detract from the mood of the

story, would go far in improving its smoothness of plot. This "Theriopangrams" thing is, in my humble opinion, a bit detracting from the quality of your book. I like the WWII theme, but a

whole lot less is being said in one page than could. And finally-- if "Stosstrupp", "FKG" and "Ninjara" are on one side of the quality spectrum, "Misty the Mouse" is definitely on the

other. I'd rather read Shanda the Panda any day. Thanks again for the printing and even though some things may not always be liked by me in particular, I always think your book is
