




















Dear LEX,


One last question: is it true that there is an opening in FUSION for writing? As far as I know it's just a rumor I heard, but I am interested. Keep up the good work, I look forward to the next



SELL-OUT SUMMER CONTINUES...

ECLIPSE OVERSHIPS 5 NEW TITLES

Hoping to avoid the barrage of titles which were forced back to press due to June sell-outs, publisher Dean Mullaney has decided to overship on key July issues of five new summer series. The first issue of Frowler will be overshipped by 25 percent, and the second issues of Hotspur, Liberty Project, Lost Planet, and Axa will be overshipped by 20 percent.

"Fan response has been really strong to the titles we've debuted this summer," says Mullaney, "and we want plenty of copies on hand to satisfy this increased demand." Heavy reorders last month took Eclipse back to press on ten different books. "We're happy to go back to press when demand warrants, but we'd much rather have the copies in the stores for immediate sale," says Mullaney.

Any overshipped books that haven't sold in ninety days are fully returnable, "though," laughs distribution manager Sean Deming, "that's not highly likely. Fan demand this summer has been at a real high. These books are as diverse a line-up as you could get, held together only by a strong commercial appeal and overall quality."

Prowler, a masked avenger comic from Scout's Tim Truman and Fashion In Action's J. K. Snyder III, has had very strong advance word of mouth. Hotspur reteams Truman and John Ostrander, the creators of Grimjack. The Liberty Project, by Kurt Busiek, James W. Fry, and Doug Hazlewood, has garnered rave reviews and enthusiastic letters from super-team fans. Loss Planer features the fan favourite art of Bo Hampton. And Axa, the post-apocalyptic barbarienne, is written by Airboy's Chuck Dixon and drawn by Enrique Romero, the man who made her a legend in Europe.

Captain Eo Hits Stores In August

The long awaited 3-D Captain Eo comic will ship no later than August 4, according to distribution manager Sean Deming. "The delay was due to waiting for approval from everyone involved," he said. The comic is an adaptation of a 3-D film starring Michael Jackson, directed by Francis Ford Coppola, and produced by George Lucas. The movie can only be seen in special theatres at Disneyland and Epcot Center.

The regular edition retails for \$3.50. The souvenir edition, an oversize version that will be sold at Disneyland and Epcot Center, retails for \$6.95 and will also ship to comics stores in early August.

Liberty, Lost Planet, Enchanter All Hot

Valkyrie!, Scout, Contractors, Terror Join Manga 2nd Runs On Sold Out List

Retailers hit the nail on the head when they dubbed the 1987 convention season as "Eclipse's sell-out summer." Those who underestimated the high summer demand for Eclipse titles have been running to their distributors to reorder, only to find in some cases that it's too little, too late. "The new series are starting to take off," says editor-in-chief Cat Yronwode, "and by the time the slower retailers realize it, faster hands will have already grabbed up the thousands of extra copies we've printed." New books already affected include Liberty Project, Lost Planet, Enchanter, Valkyriel, Contractors, Kamui, Mai, and Area 88.

Last month, Valkyrie #1 and Scout #18-19 sold out, and Eclipse was forced back to press on Miracleman #11, Reid Fleming #1-2, Kamui #1-3, Mai #1-2, and Area 88 #1-2. This month, Valkyrie #2, Scout #16-17, and the second printings of Kamui #1-3, Mai #1-2, and Area 88 #1-2 join the list of sold out titles, but sell-out activity has spread from the Valkyrie!/Scout/manga core to include Contractors #1, Tales of Terror #12, Enchanter #1, Liberty Project #1, and Lost Planet #2.

"Lost Planet #2 was overshipped on a returnable basis, so distributors may still have copies available," says distribution manager Sean Deming. "We just can't get copies of those other titles, however. Of course, anything not on the sold out list (above) is still available for reorders. I'm expecting another list of sold out titles next month, though. Retailers should take a good hard look at what's moving and get their reorders in immediately.

"Retailers who were burned by last year's black and white glut have a tight cash flow right now, and we understand that," says publisher Dean Mullaney. "This recent flurry of reorder activity is a direct result of overly cautious ordering. Unfortunately, we have to set our print runs near the level of initial orders. When a book becomes hot and retailers underorder, we all lose sales."

Consistent sell-outs on Scout over the last four months are merely a prelude to Swords of Texas and New America, the two new mini-series that will spin off this fall from Scout #24, the last issue of that series. When Swords and New America conclude this winter, Scout: War Shaman will begin the all new adventures of Timothy Truman's hard-hitting hero. "Fan anticipation is really heating up sales on all the Scout-related titles," says editor. Yronwode. "Many retailers are going to be hard-hit to provide back issues when War Shaman takes off in January."

Winter World Features "Next Al Williamson"

Argentinean Zaffino Makes American Comics Debut

Winter World, a three issue mini-series, is the next title to join the 4Winds line from Eclipse. Jorge Zaffino, a popular artist in Argentina, makes his American debut on the book, much to the delight of writer Chuck Dixon. "It just looks real good," he says. "It's very realistic, very gritty, and also very dynamic."

Editor Tim Truman gives Zaffino terse praise: "He could be the next Al Williamson," he says.

Dixon—who writes Airboy, Strike!, Axa, Savage Sword of Conan, and Evangeline—has created a brutal future for the denizens of Winter World. "The earth is entirely frozen over," he says. "It's hundreds of years in the future, and present day civilization is all but forgotten. Scully, the main character, is a trade rider. He travels from one little pocket of civilization to the next, trading goods that he finds in shopping centers and malls under the ice."

Winter World #1, a full-colour, monthly, Baxter mini-series, ships September 22 and retails for \$1.75.

Xyr Introduces Multiple Ending Craze To Comics

Graphic Novel Changes Each Time You Read It

The first multiple ending comic debuts when Xyr, a 48-page, full-colour, squarebound comic book, hits the stands in October. "These sorts of projects have done very successfully in bookstores," says distribution manager Sean Deming, who also edited Xyr. "It was about time someone did a comics story with multiple endings."

In Xyr, the reader makes a variety of choices for the lead character, each of which takes the story in a different direction. There are nine possible stories in the volume, but each begins with the disappearance of August Chiller, who sets off in search of the mystical paradise of Valcin. His wife calls on Xyr, the only being who can possibly save her husband. "This has been the most difficult chal-

"This has been the most difficult challenge I've faced as an editor," says Deming. Each scene must be carefully tailored to it fits into a variety of story continuities

So it fits into a variety of story continuities.

Xyr is a full-colour, 48-page, square-bound comic book. It retails for \$3.95 and ships October 27.

Prowler #3 Features "History" of Eclipsogram Pictures

Lobby Cards, Still Photos Bring Kragg's Story To Life

Michael H. Price, co-author with George Turner of Forgonen Horrors and writer of the 1940s Prowler back-up, has combined both his interest in motion picture scholarship and the bizarre world of Leo Kragg in Prowler #3. That issue features what purports to be an excerpt from Neglected Gens of The Horror Cinema by George Michaels, detailing the history of Kragg's involvement in film.

The fake book entry explains Leo Kragg's ownership of Eclipsogram Pictures and the series of motion pictures about the Prowler which were filmed in the Forties and Fifties. Also included are lobby cards, complete with photos from On The Prowl, the most successful Prowler film.

"We found an actor here in Ft. Worth, Bob Allen, who not only wears the Prowler costume well, but also looks remarkably like Graham Nolan's drawings of Leo," says Price. "We had the mask tailored to his face and decked him out in clothing fashionable in the early Forties. It wasn't until I compared him side by side with Graham Nolan's character sheets that I realized how striking a resemblance there was—the hairline, set of the jaw, the intense eyes, and what Chuck Dixon calls 'a mouthful of teeth."

Prowler #3, a 4Winds production, retails for \$1.75 and ships September 13.

Stig's #7 Last Issue

Templeton Decides
To End Hit Series

Although its sales were solid and it was rapidly achieving cult status, Sig's Inferno has ended with issue #7. Acclaimed by many as one of the only worthwhile black and white humor comics, Sig's was a strong addition to Eclipse's Quality Black and White Graphics line, which published the last two issues of the book.

"For various personal reasons, I didn't think I could make it funny anymore," says Ty Templeton. Templeton co-create the book with Klaus Schoenefeld, who died unexpectedly of a heart attack last year. "I owed it to him (Stig) not to do it if I couldn't make it funny."


