I had seen the advanced publicity for "Samurai Penguin" and thought it would be only another in a series of books playing on the growing popularity of Japanese culture as Japanimation becomes more widely accessible; or perhaps it was another in the series of nuclear mutated funny animals that seem to be springing up faster than crabgrass all around the independents and even in the mainstream. But no, this is a fresh, new idea dissimilar to anything else being published currently.

To begin with, there are the characters; the silent hero, the somber ruler, the megalomaniac villain, and the fluff headed members of the colony. they may all be stereotypes, but they are all delightful. They seem so incongruous next to each other yet they work so well together.

The artwork was highly stylized but enjoyable. The story's flow was aided greatly by the layout of the pages. It is always a pleasure to see a story, presumably designed to be told graphically, presented in an interesting and exciting manner.

The sense of flow between the images in the panels was exceptional. There were two panels, however, (specifically pages 5 & 11) in which the black became so heavy as to make the figures unclear. This may be due partially to reproduction, but some it seemed to be a lack of the gray shading used to good effect through the rest of the book.

There were also two moments when the layout of the page made the dialogue difficult to follow. I presume that the "Yeah" directed to the Skua with the arrow through him came from the mother or her chicks and not our hero. I would hope so as not having him speak throughout the whole book was quite effective.

The only other moment of unclarity in the first reading was in the conversation between the shark and Artimus on page 12. The panel order was not immediately apparent. This is not to say that there is anything wrong with making a reader work to follow dialogue, but it did not seem appropriate in this section.



The panels with the heavy black that you mentioned reproduced this way because the dot pattern in the zipatone that was used closed up more than we expected. In the second issue we are using a different process to produce the halltones that should eliminate this sort of blocking up.
