At this point in time (and to my great joy), I have a copy of every bit of Captain Jack that has been published, through keeping a sharp eye open and by ordering #1 directly (I started with #2). I am not a letter-writing person; however, after #7 has sunk in, it's reached the point where I can't help but write. Discovering that you were indirectly responsible for Megaton Man (another of my favorites) both surprised me and increased my already high opinion of you.

I got the bit about Bridie Murphy, but didn't understand the "All Bub Orchestra" reference. I found it hilarious, even though I only understood half of it. Personally, I'm not sure Herman actually "developed" Bub, since some things (the references to Bub having met Lamont Cranston and



3. If you expect me to answer this one, you're nuts! I'm already under fire for being a smut peddler!


