Dear Mr. Kazaleh:

I woke up one evening and realized that I did like Captain Jack after all, and it took me only nine issues to figure that out! You might think that by now I'd be able to recognize an artist's honest attempt to depict sensual love as an important part of his character's lives, having foundered in a similar misunderstanding of Omaha the Cat Dancer's artistic aims; but then again, Waller and Worley hadn't started out drawing pure slapstick.

The crux of my "does Kazaleh know what he's doing or not?" debate was the leap you took in your depiction of sex, from innocuous lava lamp gags to the bold unveiling of the Adam-Lela-Darwin triangle (in the same story in which Herman finds God). Thanks to 20/20 hindsight, it's easy enough to see that having developed the perfect cast and setting for a series of self-contained short subjects, you chose to get an immediate start on teaching yourself to wield the tools of character development. By the time you introduced Janet Ringtail, our heroes' discovery of romantic sex and their concurrent groping towards emotional maturity had become the substratum of the book's tireless celebration of three decades ('40s-'60s) of American popular

It's odd, but in re-reading these nine issues, I found myself laughing out loud at gags that had barely raised a smile the first time through. The fourth issue, which had almost convinced me to scrub this title from my list, suddenly stood revealed as a generous serving of American corn, with references to You Bet Your Life and

an obscure Daffy Duck cartoon ("I'm Chloe! Let's you'n'me rassle!") peppering a fluffy hommage to pre-Norman Lear TV sitcoms. All the issue needed was a

flexi-disc of canned laughter.

As for the Captain, his Top Cat/Bilko role has never been clearer (or funnier) than in the last two issues, but while the boy's got chutzpah, he's still the least interesting member of the cast! Unlike Adam and 'Bub, he's got no past; unlike Herman and Janet, he's got no future. He's a smooth-talking cypher with a questionable set of ethics and an eye to the main chance. All of that provides good character motivation, but where's the character?

As for the Low Sales Curse . . . \*sigh\* At my last job, where I was influential in getting about a half-dozen co-workers interested in some of the comix outside of the Big Two's product lines, my most consistent failures were with "funny animal" books, invariably viewed as childish (the Gladstone line) or confusing (Cerebus, Albedo). One poor guy nearly had a seizure upon seeing the lovemaking scene in Captain Jack #5. . . It's an uphill battle, Mr. Kazaleh.

The point of this letter is to tender an apology for reading your book with only half a brain up 'til now. Your work deserves better.

I find it hard to believe that the Cap'n has never shown such interest. I'm not saying you should have him hop into bed with someone, but it might be interesting to have him meet someone he was "intimate" with at one time. After all, it would allow for some

reminiscence, and that's such an interesting thing. I mean, how did the Cap'n come to join the Space Navy and later become the Cap'n of his own ship? just a thought.

Dear Captain Jack:

Captain Jack #7 is third in the series: "Farmer Fred, I'm in Love With Your Daughter." This is your best tale to date, in what has become an unexpectedly serious story.

There have been plenty of the Kazaleh sight gags we have all become accustomed to. But we still come back to this very tender relationship developing between Herman and Janet.

Bub presents a very real problem for Herman ... "Ta-da. What's the idea of starting a bath without me?" Herman loves Janet, yet he cannot do without Bub and has very little control over the little guy's actions.

The art on pages 23-27 is brilliant. There is practically no dialogue, yet the emotions are clear. I feel strongly the thoughts that are going on in the minds of those two people. One a dog and the other a raccoon.

Janet seems to be an excellent character for this comic. Janet is sexy, feisty and capable of a wide range of emotions. I love the expression on her face (pg. 6, panel 2) when she remarks: "Herman, I do not want any invisible men watching me bathe.'

We can look forward to having Janet around for at least one more episode of your funny animal space opera. I hope she stays a bit longer. Your strip is blessed with three dogs and a cat. There seems to be a real void that could be filled with a girl who is a raccoon. I see real possibilities here both comic and dramatic.

The Adventures of Captain Jack has matured as a comic over the first seven issues. Characters have developed beyond the zany slapstick which has been your hallmark, and what initially attracted me to your comic. But no amount of funny business could make up for the way you have involved the reader and kept us hanging in the last episode.

There are only two comics for which the wait between issues becomes interminable: Albedo and The Adventures of Captain Jack. I enjoy reading anthropomorphic comics and Fantagraphics Books publishes several very good funny animal books, Captain Jack is the best.

Captain Jack is a queer little 'zine. Your line art is sparse-almost crude (when compared to Waller or Gallacci)-but this is a deception. On its pages, Captain Jack contains a wealth of warm mirthful characters whose personality dynamics unfold over the months in fascinating detail. The dramatic (romantic) and humorous potential for this book just seem to multiply.

The Adventures of Captain Jack has become my own private little comic. I don't know anybody else who reads it. I faithfully buy my two issues and push it on all my friends. I tell them: "This is funny stuff. You gotta start reading Captain Jack." But so far not a convert among them. \*Sigh\*

I found the ending to Captain Jack #9 to be vaguely troubling. Because it was exactly that, an ending. Are you just bringing a long story to a close? Or is this the result of the uncertain fate of Captain Jack? If Fantagraphics is going to discontinue publishing, it seems you wanted to tie up loose plot ends so as not to leave your readers devastated with an unfinished story.

After issue #8, Captain Jack has quietly slipped into quarterly publication. If that will help keep the book afloat, I am in favor of it. Four Captain Jacks a year are better than none. If the axe does fall, what are the chances of continuing as a semiregular feature in Critters? Nobody wants to see that happen, but I am grasping at straws here.

Given time, The Adventures of Captain Jack will earn stacks of money. Resume a monthly publication. There will be movies, a weekly Saturday morning cartoon, video games! People will be clamoring for your biography rights, Mike, if you just hang in there.


