Half Empty

Marvel Comics has announced that it will be distributing its comics exclusively through its recently acquired subsidiary, Heroes World. The repercussions of this will certainly be bad for the industry, and could spell disaster.

With stores forced by economic necessity to buy Marvel comics through Heroes World (or else lose a whopping chunk of their profits), and with other companies' comics not available through Heroes World, two things will definitely happen: (1) a very small percentage of stores will go "Marvels only," but, more importantly, (2) stores which accept the burden of buying through two distributors (or more) will have their dollars spread thinner because splitting their orders between two distributors will reduce the discount they get due to volume ordering. This means lower profits for all publishers as retailers become more selective, with smaller independents being the hardest hit. Borderline stores that don't roll with the changes will probably have to close down from loss of profit.

All distributors (except Heroes World) will have to discontinue, and some will go out of business entirely. Belt tightening at the distributors will be another blow to smaller publishers, as they find themselves faced with fewer distribution options and possibly even a market where Marvel, DC, Dark Horse and even Image go to exclusive distribution deals with various distributors, further fragmenting the retailer's attention.

As some independent publishers go out of business, retailers could suffer a further blow due to an overall drop in customers; comic readership will flatten instead of growing if the variety isn't there to draw in nontraditional readers.

Unavoidably, the overall results will be shrunken profits for publishers, distributors and retailers alike, business casualties in all areas of the industry; less variety for readers; continued stagnation of comics as being gaudy superhero fluff for kids; and possibly, if the domino effect gets really bad, a partial or total collapse of the direct market for comics.

But at least Marvel will be making more money.

... OR HALF FULL?

Marvel's decision to distribute exclusively through Heroes World is one of the most exciting and potentially most positive developments the comics industry has seen in years. Finally, the stage has been set for a showdown from which comics as a whole can only benefit.

Because Marvel makes up less than 40% of direct market sales, it should be obvious that all retailers who offer any sort of variety at all will have to start buying from multiple distributors. Initially, losing their Marvel sales will be hard on the other distributors, but to make up for it, they're going to have to start pushing independents much harder; there's simply no way for them to make up for the lost sales through DC, Dark Horse and Image, which are already very high-profile and thus harder to sell in increased quantities. So retailers will be seeing even more exposure on independents at the same time that they're facing (probably) tougher discounting structures on their Marvels. Loss of the big discount that comes with buying through a single distributor will make retailers more selective on both Marvels and all others.

That increased selectivity should translate into an increased demand for quality comic products, as well as a hunger for new "hot" books. As competition heats up on all fronts — retail, publishing and distribution — well-organized companies producing quality products will assuredly prosper. Good information and reliability will be at a premium.

By making itself into a leaner, meaner publishing company with direct access to retailers, Marvel has thrown its glove in the industry's face. It's made a gutsy move and left the rest of us to respond. New methods of doing business will have to be found. New attitudes about ordering by retailers. New focuses for promotional emphasis by distributors. New awareness of retailer and distributor needs by publishers.

As we struggle to find these innovations, some in the industry may fall on tough times. But those who see the opportunities and seize them will prosper.

Wild Life #10 was one of the neater issues. I hope this magazine picks up the circulation it deserves; it's probably the

best of the three anthropomorphic anthologies in overall story quality.

The Wildlifers could support their own series; I'm amazed that such a high level of frantic energy is being maintained in it. A minor technical point, though; I don't think steam powered VCRs showed up in classrooms before the late seventies and early eighties, not 1961 as the first panel implied. During my school days through the seventies, we used movie projectors (translucent analog photographs on a strip of plastic with sprocket holes) which were powered by captured war slaves on treadmills.

"Comedy, She Wrote" was quite funny, but I think it pushed the single joke a little far; it might have worked better in a shorter format.

"Jaux the Lion" was amusing; I'm looking forward to additional installments. I'm glad that Shon can handle sequential art and he's certainly pushing the boundaries of the PG rating further than anyone since Steven Spielberg. (Shon Howell found a story about a large-breasted lesbian top? Who'd a think it? The characters' accents are distinctive; what region is it? "Furrtual Reality" was a chore!; I'd like to see more Coyote stories in the future. I remember the backups in the old *Usagi Yojimbo*; those were some of the few stories you could talk about 'mythic archetypes' without feeling pretentious. "Buffalo Wings", as always, was nifty.
